

ZoomerMedia Donation Funds Expansion of Writer in Residence Program by Cathy Nickel

AU will be adding a new dimension to its Writer in Residence Program thanks to financial support from ZoomerMedia, publishers of *Zoomer* magazine.

Zoomer magazine is distributed to members of the Canadian Association for Retired Persons, Canada's largest not-for-profit association for people aged 45 and over and those who care for them. Last September, ZoomerMedia committed to funding a new facet of the Writer in Residence Program, one that will engage people with a lifetime of stories to tell: seniors.

Tololwa M. Mollel, AU's writer in residence for 2011-12, works with students of all ages and from all around the world to elevate the quality of their writing. He occupies what he calls "the middle ground, somewhere between cheerleader and critic," providing feedback that helps students hone their writing skills.

"Writing is always tough, and you do much of it in isolation," the celebrated children's author and dramatist said. "It's also very personal. I can't write for people, but I can offer the good, honest, supportive advice that's required of any mentor."

"Writing is seen as a key to healthy aging," Mollel said of ZoomerMedia's interest in supporting this creative opportunity. "It's a tool that can be used to support mental health as people advance in years. It's a way to look back on experiences and relive life."

In addition to being a means of helping more writers, expanding the horizons of the Writer in Residence Program is also a way to build community, said Marilyn Dumont, a Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences writing instructor who was instrumental in creating the program.

"It's a wonderful opportunity to partner with all kinds of organizations. Writing offers value to people from age 22 to 82, and the Writer in Residence Program is a great resource for writers, students and faculty."

Still in development, the new seniors oriented part of the program is likely to include in-person and online talks by Mollel, web-conferenced workshops, virtual space on AU's e-Lab through which CARP members can connect to the program and create their own e-portfolios, and writing-focused articles and videos for ZoomerMedia online and print publications.

"Working with seniors lets me spread my wings and think about different forms of writing," Mollel said. "I can see how powerful writing can be as you get older."

The Writer in Residence Program was launched in 2010 with funding from the Canada Council for the Arts and the Alberta Foundation for the Arts. Continuation of that funding and the additional support from ZoomerMedia will allow Mollel to provide opportunities for even more writers.

Donations in support of the Writer in Residence Program represent just a few of many contributions to AU's ongoing \$30 million Open Our World Campaign.

Lessig Lectures on Corruption and the Financial Crisis

Award-winning ethicist and Harvard Law School professor Dr. Lawrence Lessig, who received an honorary Doctor of Laws from AU in 2010, presented the lecture "Institutional Corruption and the Financial Crisis" earlier this month at the University of Buffalo. The lecture was part of the high profile Gerald S. Lippes Speaker Series, which focuses on current issues and topics related to business and finance.

Finkel Provides Election Commentary

A column about the Alberta election by AU history professor Dr. Alvin Finkel appeared on *Troy Media*. "There is an air of unreality about the Alberta election," Finkel writes. "Right-wing parties are stealing spending promises from the NDP and Liberal playbooks and adding their own, while insisting they will eliminate the provincial deficit and never raise taxes."

Scavenging for Information

Dr. Cheryl Kier, an assistant professor of psychology in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, will present "Scavenger Hunt to Teach Information Retrieval," the fourth in a series of practical conversations about online teaching and learning sponsored by the Centre for Learning Design and Development.

To help students gain a better understanding of how to use library resources, Kier has designed an assignment that requires students to find answers to questions using AU's online library databases. Just as a scavenger hunt requires people to find a variety of items, this assignment requires students to find answers to a variety of questions. While the assignment is related to course material for PSYC 426: The Psychology of Families and Parenting, it can be adapted for use in any course.

Developing such basic research skills is important to students as it helps them to locate sources for their essays. The exercise prompted one student to write, "I feel now that I truly understand the library system and how to access information via digital format."

Kier's presentation will take place in Room 1217 at AU Edmonton from 1 to 2:30 p.m. on April 30. Use the Adobe Connect session link to join the presentation via Adobe Connect.
