CRAIG ROGERS OF VANCOUVER IS the first recipient of the K.K. Hutchinson Award, recognizing the professional and academic achievements of students entering the *RAIC Centre for Architecture at AU*.

Rogers is an intermediate technologist with Neale Staniszkis Doll Adams Architects of Vancouver, B.C., and previously worked with Stuart Howard Architects Inc., also of Vancouver. He holds a Bachelor of Environmental Design degree from the University of Manitoba and is enrolled in AU's Post-Baccalaureate Diploma in Architecture Program.

The K.K. Hutchinson Award was created last year by a donation from Ralph and Janet Hutchinson and the Daytona Group of companies. The scholarship honours the contributions of Ralph's brother, architect Ken Hutchinson, to the practice of architecture in western Canada.

Arts and Science Research Talks Update

E-learning and Access to Justice


A November 23 team presentation, involving Archie Zariski and Dale Dewhurst from Legal Studies in the Centre for Social Sciences and Dr. Mohamed Ally of the Centre for Distance Education, described the early results of a research project funded by the Alberta Law Foundation to investigate the potential of e-learning in the delivery of legal services to rural and remote communities in Alberta.

As part of this project, the research team has investigated the legal needs of citizens and the capacities and capabilities of information and communication technologies, including mobile learning, to meet those needs. The project has also reviewed lessons learned from related research in other jurisdictions.

The project findings characterized the legal and technological landscapes of the selected communities and identified a number of needs to properly improve the legal literacy of northern communities.



Fantasy Feminism and Archiving On Our Backs

On December 7, the Arts and Science Research Talks Series hosted Sarah Mann, a student of literary studies in Master of Arts – Integrated Studies Program, whose presentation focused on an archiving project funded by the AU Graduate Student Research Fund. Mann is working at the Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives where she is indexing the original run (1984-1994) of On Our Backs magazine, the first national U.S. print magazine of lesbian pornography.

Mann's project involved documenting, in a digital database for use by other researchers, each story, photograph, advertisement and letter to the editor printed in the magazine during the period of its publication by the original owners.

Mann described the history of the magazine in the context of the feminist "sex wars" and North American censorship and the struggles of defining keywords for controversial or even criminalized sexual behaviours through a feminist lens today. She concluded that the On Our Backs archive is suggestive of both the promises and the limitations of sex-positive and queer representation. Both presentations were recorded and can be accessed through the Centre for Research website.

The next Arts and Science Research Talks presentation on March 22 will feature Dr. Leslie Johnson, associate professor of anthropology in the Centre for Social Sciences, and Aileen Reilly.

Conflict Resolution in the Workplace

CONFLICT RESOLUTION IN THE Workplace, the third and final session in the Wellness Committee's Dealing with Conflict Series, will be offered in the Governing Council Chambers at AU Athabasca and through Adobe Connect from noon to 1 p.m. on Wednesday, April 17.

Unresolved conflict in the workplace can negatively affect the employees involved, other employees and the organization as a whole by lowering productivity and morale. The approach taken to managing conflict determines whether stress or opportunities for growth will be created. This seminar will examine various types of workplace conflict and provide participants with a model for successfully resolving it.

At the end of this seminar, participants will be able to define conflict and recognize its causes and effects, understand different conflict management styles and when each one is most effective, and resolve conflict through negotiation.
