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The ARC is a breathtaking structure, its design diverging from the box style of so many twentieth century buildings. The building's east wall curves gently outward, and the spruce and pine roof is at a 15 degree angle. Large windows on all three floors provide panoramic views of the surrounding countryside, and they have been

configured so that natural sunlight will continuously illuminate the building as the sun travels across the daytime sky.

Award-winning Public Affairs Veteran Tom St. Denis Joins CSLS

Tom St. Denis, the creator of the Department of National Defence program that was the basis of AU's Journalism in Conflict Zones course (CMNS 451), has joined the Centre for State and Legal Studies as an adjunct professor of communication studies and has also won an award for developing the program.

St. Denis received the 2011 Department of National Defence Innovation Award for developing the program, which places Canadian soldiers and journalism students in a replicated Afghanistan war zone at the Canadian Manoeuvre Training Centre in Wainwright, Alta.

For just over two weeks, the soldiers and journalism students involved in the course receive training in how to operate in a war zone by behaving as if they are in an actual war zone for 24 hours a day. Each day the students produce news in a fully functional print and broadcast newsroom helmed by seasoned news producers.

"We are delighted to welcome Tom St. Denis to the Communication Studies Program," said program coordinator Dr. Evelyn Ellerman. Aside from a long career in public affairs and journalism, she said, St. Denis brings substantial professional knowledge of the Canadian military to AU: "He is working with the university to extend its ability to address the study of the relationship between media, the military and Canadian society."

St. Denis has spent almost two decades working as a public affairs officer for the DND and a decade working as a print journalist in Africa and Asia.

The grants match or supplement donations by citizens of Alberta to humanitarian projects of their choosing.

Nathan Gafuik Vaulting to Success

AU student Nathan Gafuik of Calgary has become the first Canadian gymnast to capture two individual medals at a single world university games.

Competing at the twenty-sixth Summer Universiade, held in Shenzhen, China, in August, Gafuik won Canada's first medal of the games, a bronze in the individual all-around competition. He added a silver in the vault on the final day of men's artistic gymnastics competitions.

"It feels pretty good. It's not exactly the medal I wanted, but it'll do," Gafuik said. He came close to adding a third medal to his collection, for his performance on the horizontal bar, but an exceptional performance by the final competitor dropped him from third to fourth in the final standings for that event.

Gafuik was an alternate with the Canadian squad at the 2005 Summer Universiade in Izmir, Turkey, but did not compete.

Another AU student, Jackson Payne of Edmonton, also competed at this year's Summer Universiade as part of Canada's four-member men's artistic gymnastics team. Payne is the reigning all-around floor and pommel horse national champion and won the rings event at the 2011 Canada, U.S.A., China Three Way Competition, held in Calgary in March.

Edmondson's Books Being Developed for TV

A Canadian production company has optioned Jill Edmondson's successful Sasha Jackson mystery books for a television series to be developed for a cable network.

"I can't give many details yet," Edmondson, a 2009 MAIS graduate, said. "I have no idea how involved I'll be, and I know it will be ages before cameras start rolling, but it's exciting nonetheless."

Two of Edmondson's novels featuring private investigator Sasha Jackson have been published since 2009, and a third is due in bookstores this November.

Edmondson's MAIS concentration was in cultural studies with an emphasis on literature, writing and drama, and she said that

she has been able to parlay much of her MAIS experience into her personal and professional life. Two independent reading courses on crime fiction, with assistant professor Dr. Veronica Thompson, benefited her greatly when she was working on Blood and Groom, her first published novel, she said.

A paper for MAIS 635: Equality on Context, indirectly led to her second novel Dead Light District. "The final essay was on human rights and the sex trade," she said. "I did tons of research for the assignment and learned all sorts of interesting—and horrifying—things about the world of commercial sex and human rights. A lot of the information simply didn't make it into the final essay. I hated the idea of not using it somewhere, somehow. Eventually, I used a lot of that leftover info as the background to the plot of Dead Light District."

Controlling Knowledge: Freedom of Information and Privacy Protection in a Networked World

In *Controlling Knowledge*, Dr. Lorna Stefanick offers a provocative inquiry into the regulatory regime that governs freedom of information and the protection of privacy (FOIP).

The application of FOIP laws requires a balancing act between two potentially competing goals: the desire to provide citizens with access to the information they need in order to hold others accountable and the desire to safeguard an individual's right to privacy and protect sensitive information from abuse. To illustrate the impact of FOIP, Stefanick, an associate professor in the Centre for State and Legal Studies, examines the secondary uses of medical data, looks at the forms of surveillance that the digital age has enabled and explores the power and perils of Facebook and the Internet.

Intended to serve as a citizen's guide and written in refreshingly down-to-earth language, Controlling Knowledge is a vital resource for anyone seeking to understand the concepts and issues that drive FOIP legislation and how these laws are shaping

the individual rights of citizens in the information age.

Prior to joining AU, Stefanick was associate director of the Government Studies Unit at the University of Alberta. Having taught in a virtual environment for over a decade, she has had first-hand exposure to some of the radical ways in which new communication technologies have transformed people's working lives and social relationships.
