

# Board Approves Launch of \$30 Million Fundraising Campaign

The Board of Governors of Athabasca University approved the public launch of a \$30 million fundraising campaign on October 21.

According to AU president Dr. Frits Pannekoek, the university has been active in the quiet phase of the campaign for over 18 months and has been very successful. "I'm pleased to report that we have now exceeded the 50 per cent mark in meeting our goal," he said. "Thank you to the many people in the AU community who have helped us reach this milestone."

Pam Walsh, vice-president (advancement), urged continued participation. "I invite all members of the university community to consider taking part in this exciting and important phase of the campaign," she said.

The board will be actively involved in promoting this initiative. On November 30, 2011, it will host a function in Edmonton to raise awareness of the upcoming launch of the public phase of the campaign and to seek support. All current Board members and all former members of the AUGC, including past faculty, staff, student and alumni members, have been invited to attend. AU alumni will speak to guests about the impact that AU has had on their lives.

More information about the campaign will be provided in the November 28 issue of The Insider, and details of the public phase will be revealed as the campaign is rolled out in the weeks and months to come.

## Athabasca University Regulation Amended



The inaugural meeting of the Athabasca University General Faculties Council, which replaces the Athabasca University Academic Council, took place in Athabasca on November 8, 2011.

The Athabasca University Regulation, the provincial government regulation under the Post-Secondary Learning Act which controls governance of AU, was amended by Order in Council on July 26, 2011. The two major amendments were a change in the university's corporate name and replacement of the university's Academic Council with a new General Faculties Council.

Effective October 1, 2011, the legal name of the Athabasca University Governing Council changed to the Governors of Athabasca University. The amendment states: "The corporation formerly named the Athabasca University Governing Council is continued as the board of Athabasca University under the name the Governors of Athabasca University."

As a result of this change, the name on such things as parchments, agreements, legal documents and the corporate seal will be the Governors of Athabasca University, and the body previously referred as Governing Council will now be referred to as the board.

The replacement of the Athabasca University Academic Council with the Athabasca University General Faculties Council also took effect on October 1. As a result of this change the AUAC and all of its standing committees ceased to exist. In anticipation of this change, the AUAC established the Ad Hoc Governance Review Committee in 2006 with the mandate to undertake a review of AU's academic governance structure. With the proclamation of the amended Athabasca University Regulation on July 26, this committee was reconvened and the Office of the University Secretariat has worked closely with it to develop general by-laws for the General Faculties Council and terms of reference for identified standing committees. The committee presented its report at a special AUAC meeting, the AUAC's last meeting as a council, on September 27.

At the inaugural meeting of the Athabasca University General Faculties Council, held in Athabasca on November 8, the first order of business was approval of the general by-laws and terms of reference for standing committees. Nominations for the GFC standing committees are now being sought with elections to be held at the council's next meeting. The GFC and its standing committees should be fully operational by the beginning of 2012.

On November 15, the Alberta Women's Memory Project is holding A Celebration of Women's Voices from the Past to the Future, the project's inaugural fundraiser, in Edmonton.

As a member of the committee responsible for the Alberta Women's Memory Project library consultant Jean Crozier is helping to make sure that historical records relating to Alberta women are digitally documented. Once these records are loaded onto the AWMP website, researchers, students and the general public can access them from anywhere in the world and learn about Alberta women's influence on history.

"Unless we record the past, people just won't know what went on," Crozier said. "The women of my generation went through a hell of a lot."

## Call for 2012 Order of Athabasca University Nominations



# Centre for Learning Design and Development Hosts UNISA Visitor

Azwy Tshivhase, a director in the Directorate for Curriculum and Learning Development at the University of South Africa (UNISA) recently spent four weeks with AU's Centre for Learning Design and Development, gathering information related to institutional policies and procedures for distance education, open and distance education methods, and learning design and development processes for online and distance delivery of courses.

UNISA, a distance education university with over 350,000 students, is, like AU, in the process of moving from print to online delivery, so Tshivhase's visit provided an excellent opportunity to share information on a number of issues affecting both institutions.

Tshivhase's visit was co-ordinated by Dr. Iain Grant, manager of special projects in the Office of the Vice-President Academic, under an international fellowship program. After interviewing CLDD staff members and visiting other units in the university, he wrapped up his visit with a presentation to the entire CLDD staff and guests in Governing Council Chambers on October 20.

Tshivhase is not the first representative of UNISA to visit the CLDD. Professor Wendy Kilfoil, also from the Directorate for Curriculum and Learning Development, visited in 2007. AU looks forward to a continued warm and productive relationship with its sister institution as we both strive to meet the challenges of distance delivery in an online world.

From a new survey on student technology use, published in the Chronicle of Higher Education:

- Fifty-eight per cent of the 3,000 students surveyed use Facebook to communicate with other students about their coursework.

# Third Open Access Week Features Lively Discussion by Erin Ottosen

AU's 2011 Open Access Week activities attracted 272 webcast participants and plenty of lively discussion about open educational resources and their role in the future of post-secondary education. This is the third year that AU has participated in the annual international event.

The theme of this year's event, organized by Library Services, was the growing movement toward using open educational resources, learning materials such as textbooks that are freely available online to both students and educators. Webcasts such as Moving to Open Educational Resources at Athabasca University looked at how such resources can be used more widely at AU.

All of the Open Access Week webcasts were recorded and will be archived on the Open Access Week website in the coming weeks. Webcasts from previous years' events are also available there.

Tony Tin, head of digital initiatives and electronic resources in Library Services was the lead organizer for this year's Open Access Week activities. "I would like to express my gratitude to the speakers and participants for their contribution and involvement in the event," he said, adding that he encourages anyone with comments or suggestions for the 2012 event to contact him,

## The AU Library and Open Educational Resources

Library Services is a key supporter of open educational resources at AU.

"We make our tools, digital content and mobile learning resources freely and openly available to the general public, without asking users to pay fees," said Tony Tin, head of digital initiatives and electronic resources at Library Services. "Open educational resources have allowed the library to improve access to learning resources and facilitate the transfer of knowledge and information to learners more efficiently."

Library Services has undertaken a number of initiatives related to open educational resources:

- It has developed a federated search tool that allows users to search OER repositories easily.
- It is working on its own OER repository, a fully searchable database that will provide easy access to e-books, learning objects, articles, audio and video files and other open educational resources.
- It has developed open educational resources for mobile devices that offer lessons on English as a second language, workplace English and French.

Providing knowledge for free allows the library to equalize access to educational opportunities across the world, Tin said. "By sharing and reusing resources, the costs for accessing and producing such resources can be reduced. Openness is the breath of life for education and research."
